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# Session 1 — Before the Mirror of God's Word Results in a Proper Attitude Towards Sin

# 1 John 1:8-2:2

- A. Two Attitudes Towards Sin
  - 1. Wrong Attitude-verses 8 and 10
  - 2. Right Attitude-verse 9 and 2:1, 2

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## Questions to Consider — Session 1 1 John 1:8-2:2 — What is Your Attitude Towards Sin?

- 1. Read 1 John 1:1-2:2.
  - a. What things does John say in this passage that is similar to one another? (Repeated themes or words)
  - b. Why do you think he repeats himself?
  - c. What do you think it means "to deceive ourselves" as it says in verse 8?
- 2. Memorize 1 John 2:1
- 3. John says, "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves." (1:8).
  - a. List the other things that we can be deceived about according to the following verses: Matthew 24:1-13; 1 Corinthians 3:18-23; 1 Corinthians 6:9,10; 1 Corinthians 15:33; Galatians 6:3,7,8; James 1:22; James 1:26
  - b. Looking back at these verses in their context, what is the remedy for self-deception?
- 4. QUESTION:
  - a. How could you use the following verses to confront the error of those who say that they have no sin? Ecclesiastes 7:20; Isaiah 53:6; 64:6; Romans 3:10-23.
  - b. What is the solution to the error of their way? See Psalm 32:5.
- 5. OUESTION:
  - a. What role does Jesus Christ our Advocate and the Holy Spirit our Advocate play? See John 14:16, 26; 15:26; 16:7-14; Romans 8: 26; Romans 8:34; Hebrews 4:14-16.
  - b. How do these verses encourage you as you walk through this life?

- a. What does Proverbs 28:13 say?
- b. Are you in the habit of confessing your sins before God and others?

#### 7. QUESTION:

- a. Take some time this week to read and pray through Psalms 6, 32, 38, and 51. These are Penitential Psalms (Psalms of Repentance).
- b. Do your attitudes towards sin match those of the Psalmist?

- a. Do you justify your sin or blame others for your sin?
- b. After studying this passage, what do you believe the proper attitude towards sin should be?
- c. What changes will *you* now make?
- 9. What sin(s) in your life need to be eradicated? Come with a prayer request addressed to your Advocate, Jesus Christ the Righteous One!

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# Session 2 — Before the Mirror of God's Word Results in Love of the Brethren 1 John 2:7-11

- 1. The Nature of the Old Commandment—verse 7
- 2. The Nature of the New Commandment—verse 8
- 3. The Nature of Those who Hate their Brother—Verses 9 & 11
- 4. The Nature of Those who Love their Brother—Verse 10

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# Questions to Consider — Session 2 1 John 2:7-11 — Do You Love Your Brother?

- 1. In 1 John 2:7, 8, John mentions an old commandment that they had heard from the beginning.
  - a. Read Leviticus 19:18 to discover what this old commandment was.
  - b. So then, what does John mean in verse 8 by a new commandment? See John 13:34.
  - c. What makes this commandment different from the old commandment?
  - d. Do you think verses 7 and 8 are contradictory?
  - e. Why or why not?

#### 2. OUESTION:

- a. According to 1 John 2:9, 10, how does one know for sure if he is a believer?
- b. How does John describe loving one's brother later on in this epistle? See 1 John 3:17, 18.
- c. List some ways that we can "measure up" to John's description of loving our brother.
- 3. Read Matthew 25:31-46 and answer the following questions
  - a. What animals does Jesus use to describe those who love the brethren and those who hate the brethren?
  - b. Why do you think He uses these different animals?
  - c. What deeds characterize those who love the brethren and those who hate the brethren?
  - d. What are the destinations of those who love the brethren and of those who hate the brethren?
  - e. Do you think the goats knew they were lost? Why or why not?

- a. Why is loving the brethren so imperative? See John 13:35; Romans 13:8; 1 Corinthians 13, and 1 John 4:11.
- b. Rewrite the qualities of love from 1 Corinthians in your own words.
- c. What changes do you need to make so that you will love others in the way described in 1 Corinthians 13?

- a. Do you love the brethren?
- b. What proof is there in your life that you love the brethren? (For the brave, ask those closest to you, "Does my life manifest that I indeed love the brethren?")

- a. Is there someone you need to love more actively?
- b. What will you do about it?
- 7. In what areas has the Lord convicted you? Write out a prayer request to share.

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# Session 3 — Before the Mirror of God's Word Results in Hating the World 1 John 2:15-17 — Three Deadly Sins

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# Questions to Consider — Session 3 Three Deadly Sins! 1 John 2:15-17

- 1. Read 1 John 2:15-17.
  - a. What is the main command in these verses?
  - b. Why do you think John transitions into this subject after verses 12-14?

#### 2. OUESTION:

- a. Read the accounts in Genesis 3:1-6 and Matthew 4:1-11, and note the ways in which Eve and the Lord were both tempted by the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life.
- b. How did Christ withstand the temptation?
- c. Why did Eve not withstand the temptation?
- d. What do you learn from both examples?

#### 3. OUESTION:

- a. How does James describe worldliness in James chapter 4?
- b. What words does James use to describe those who love the world?
- c. What is the remedy for worldliness according to James?

- a. What does John 3:16 say?
- b. What does 1 John 2:15 say? How do you reconcile these verses?

- a. Why is it imperative according to 1 John that believers not love the world? 1 John 2:16-17; 1 John 5:19.
- b. What other passages come to mind that warn us of the dangers of loving the world?

#### 6. QUESTION:

- a. What did Jesus pray in John 17:11, 14-15?
- b. How can a believer be in the world but not of the world? Support your answer with Scripture.

#### 7. QUESTION:

- a. What do *you* think worldliness is?
- b. What are some common forms of worldliness?
- c. What are some forms of worldliness that you personally are drawn to?
- d. How do you resist those temptations?

- a. Honestly evaluate your life in light of the following questions.
- b. Am I in love with this world?
- c. How am I enticed by the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, or the pride of life? (For example: Do I concentrate on satisfying the lusts of my flesh? What attracts the attention of my eyes? Am I proud about my accomplishments or myself?)
- d. Am I doing the will of the Father?
- 9. Please write down a prayer request after contemplating question 8.

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# Session 4 — With the Master Before the Mirror of God's Word Results in Discerning Truth from Error 1 John 4:1-6

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# Questions to Consider — Session 4 Discerning Truth from Error — 1 John 4:1-6

#### 1. QUESTION:

- a. What are the differences between those who are false and those who are true, according to 1 John 4:1-6?
- b. Who is behind false prophets, antichrists, and those who teach error? (c) What test does John give us in this passage that helps us to discern false teachers?
- 2. John gives us some ways to test false prophets in 1 John 4:1-6. However, there are other ways to discern false prophets. What are they, according to the following passages? Deuteronomy 13:1-5; Deuteronomy 18:20-22; Isaiah 8:19, 20; Matthew 7:15-23; Galatians 1:8; 1 Timothy 4:1-3; 2 Peter 2; Jude 4, 8, 10, 16.

#### 3. QUESTION:

- a. Do you think all believers can discern false teachers? See Matthew 24:24; John 16:13; 1 John 4:6.
- b. How should Christians respond to false teachers? See Deuteronomy 13:1-5; Titus 3:10, 11; 2 John 7-11.
- c. Why should we respond that way? (Answer this question according to the preceding passages.)

- a. What is going to happen to false teachers? See 2 Peter 2:1, 12, 13, 17; Jude 11-15.
- b. How can you encourage or exhort those who are engrossed in error?
- 5. How does 1 John 4:4 give you comfort?

- a. Do you think you can discern false prophets?
- b. How can you be more discerning after this lesson?
- c. Who are some of the false teachers and/or some of the false religions in our day, and how did you discern that? Do you know anyone who has been swept away by false teaching and/or false teachers? How might we pray for them? Please write your burden down in the form of a prayer request.

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Session 5 — With the Master Before the Mirror of God's Word Results in Understanding the Depth of the Father's Love! How Deep The Father's Love for US!

#### 1 John 4:7-12

Two-fold reason why we should love others.

- 1. We love others, because love is the nature of God. (Verses 7-10)
- 2. We love others because God loves us. (Verses 11, 12)

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## Questions to Consider — Session 5 1 John 4:7-12 — How Deep The Father's Love For Us!

- 1. Read 1 John 4:7-12.
  - a. How many times does John mention the word *love* or some form of the word?
  - b. What are the different ways that John uses the word, *love*?
  - c. What other word do you notice that John repeats several times?
- 2. Memorize 1 John 4:10.
- 3. John says that God showed His love by sending His son to die for us.
  - a. Choose *one* of the gospel accounts of the death of Christ and summarize in your own words what Christ endured on your behalf. (Matthew 26 and 27; Mark 14 and 15; Luke 22 and 23 *or* John 18 and 19.)
  - b. Do you love others to that extent?
  - c. How can you sacrificially love others?
  - d. What do you think John means in 1 John 4:11?

- a. According to 1 John 4:10, who loved first, God or us?
- b. According to Romans 5:7-9, was there anything in us that solicited that love from God?
- c. How does Paul describe our sinful condition in Romans 3:9-18?
- d. How does this passage in Romans help you to understand the depth of God's love for you?
- e. What is the promise (regarding the love of God) to those whom Christ has saved, according to Romans 8:31-39?

f. What is your response to God as you consider your salvation?

#### 5. QUESTION:

- a. Why has no man seen God at any time? See John 1:18, John 4:24, John 6:46 and 1 Timothy 1:17.
- b. With those passages in mind, how do you explain Genesis 32:24-30 (especially verse 30)?
- c. How does one see God, according to what Jesus said to Philip in John 14:7-12?

- a. How have you grown in your love toward others?
- b. In what ways does the love of God motivate you to love others?
- c. In what ways do you think the church could improve in loving others?
- d. How can you be a part of that improvement?
- e. What will you do about it?
- 7. Write out your testimony of how God saved you. Especially bring out the aspects of God's love that you saw as He drew you to Himself.
- 8. What does God's love mean to you personally? Write a praise of thanksgiving to God, writing down your thoughts to Him.

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# Session 6—With the Master Before the Mirror of God's Word Results in Being Certain Where You will Spend Eternity

Three Absolutes — 1 John 5:13-15

- 1. Absolute Number One verse 13
- 2. Absolute Number Two verses 14, 15
- 3. Absolute Number Three verse 15

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## Questions to Consider — Session 6 1 John 5:13-15 — Three Absolutes

- 1. QUESTIONS:
  - a. According to 1 John 5:13-15, what three things can we be certain about?
  - b. Are you certain about these things?
- 2. John says in 1 John 5:13 that we can know we have eternal life.
  - a. What evidences has John given so far in 1 John whereby we can know for sure that we are children of God?
  - b. What are some other ways we can know for certain that we are born of God, according to Romans 8:15-17, Galatians 4:6 and 2 Peter 1:4-11?
- 3. John indicates, in 1 John 5:14 and 15, that we can be assured that God answers prayer.
  - a. According to the following passages, what might be some of the reasons that God does not answer prayer? Proverbs 21:13; Proverbs 28:9; John 9:31; John 14:13; John 15:7; James 1:5, 6; 4:1-3; 1 Peter 3:7; 1 John 3:21, 22.
  - b. What changes do you need to make, in light of these passages, in order for God to hear and answer your prayers?
- 4. Read at least *two* of the prayers from the following passages: 1 Samuel 1 and 2; 1 Kings 8:22-53; 2 Chronicles 20; Nehemiah 9; Daniel 9:3-19; Matthew 6:9-13; Ephesians 1:15-21; Ephesians 3:14-21; Philippians 1:9-11 and Colossians 1:9-14.
  - a. How do these prayers compare with the way we pray today?

- b. In what way(s) do you think your own personal prayers need to change after looking over these prayers?
- 5. From *one* of the above prayers, answer the following questions:
  - a. What petitions were made?
  - b. Were they granted?
  - c. What principles will you apply to your own prayer life?

- a. Write down at least 10 things you are asking the Lord for.
- b. How has the Lord answered these requests? (If He hasn't answered yet, keep this list so that you can record later how and when He has answered them.)

- a. Do you know for sure that you are a Christian?
- b. What assurance do you have?
- c. Do you know for sure that God hears your prayers?
- d. How do you know that? Does He answer your prayers?
- e. What is at least one prayer He has answered this week?
- 8. What do you desire from God? Write it down in a prayer to Him to share.
